
Invigorating and Intimidating KATHY SHINKLE

Traditionally, the St. Cross Vestry begins its year with a weekend retreat to discuss what is happening at St. Cross and what the focus of the year should be. This year we met the weekend of February 23-25 at Mt. Calvary Retreat House in Santa Barbara, The staff joined us for the first half of the retreat.

The Rev. David Erickson, rector of St. Mary the Virgin, San Francisco and a former associate at St. Cross, was the retreat leader. His goal: To challenge the Vestry to dream BIG about the future of St. Cross, not just for the next year but for the coming decades.

Coming off the successful capital campaign and all the current property renovations,

it seemed an appropriate challenge. St. Cross has a history of dreaming, and realizing, big things. The building the church campus and purchasing the rental properties in the '50s, starting 1736 House in the '70s and building up community in Belize in the



The challenge, according to Rev. David, is to discern what the Holy Spirit is calling St. Cross to dream, to do and to be at this time. This dream is not Rev. Rachel's dream. Nor is it the Vestry's dream. No, it is to be a dream of St. Cross—something that inspires all of us to work together to accomplish.

Rev. David led the Vestry through a series of games and exercises:

- · To recognize the difference between a BIG dream (often a leap into the unknown) and a big idea (something that can be accomplished in as little as a few months with work and funds)
- · To move from worry and cynicism to wonder (God's got it!).
- · To think big.
- · To discern the presence of the Holy Spirit (why we




The specific plans are still in their infancy but one thing each of us can do right now is to join the Vestry in its Lenten commitment to mediation: to sit quietly and simply listen.

Episco-speak: Tabernacle

What is that small box where the priest puts away the unused bread and wine after the service called? The priest stores the unused bread and wine in the tabernacle. After the bread and wine

have been blessed by the priest, the elements are placed inside. At St. Cross, the tabernacle is directly behind the altar, directly in front of the reredos below the feet of Jesus. The St. Cross tabernacle is wood with gold leaf.

Called to the Wall: Saturday, April 13

The annual Diocesan pilgrimage to the border wall with Mexico will take place on April 13, starting at 7am at the diocesan center. It will conclude at Friendship Park, on the border, where hopefully this year, we will be able to have eucharist or prayers on each side of the wall at the same time, with brothers and sisters from the church in Mexico gathering on the Tijuana side. Human Migration Event: April 6

Saturday, April 6 in 45-minute segments starting at 1 PM in Parker Hall Presented by the St. Cross Peace and Justice Community

You are a 29 year-old man and your home, along with your village, has just been destroyed in a bombing. Somehow, you and your family of 5 have survived, but there is no shelter, no food, no clean water anywhere. You need to leave. Carrying the few possessions you dug out of the rubble of your house, you and your small family begin walking. You begin to meet other survivors. You join them and a small line forms as you make your way to the coast. Once there, you look for a boat that will carry you away to a safer place. Finally, you and your family squeeze into a few inches on a heavily burdened boat. The groaning boat takes off. You pray desperately that it will not sink.

Here at St. Cross we are partnering with Doctors Without Borders to give you an experiential tour that we hope will give you some small idea of the journeys and impossible decisions these migrants must make. The experience perhaps will not only help you understand the difficulty but also feel the pain of such a journey.

The Human Migration event is modeled on an event called Forced from Home. Learn more about Forced from Home at forcedfromhome.com.

What Is a Deacon? - Part 2

In the first segment of this piece, I described what a deacon in the Episcopal Church is, as well as some of the ways he or she serves. In this article, I will answer some of the questions that arise about the difference between the diaconate (Sacred Order of Deacons) and the presbyterate (Sacred Order of Priests) and how one becomes one or the other.

I have frequently been asked about the differences between a priest and a deacon. My first response is that they are distinctly different orders of ordained ministry in the church. Paths to becoming one over the other vary. This is where the process of discernment comes into play. When a person feels strongly called to ordained ministry, she presents herself to the rector of her parish to discuss that

Pastoral Care Corner

Perhaps you noticed the signs at both entrances to the church sanctuary: "During Lent, we ask for your silence before the service." Have you found the sanctuary quieter than normal?

Prolonged silence is almost a foreign experience in our culture. Wherever we go, there is almost always noise. Whether it is music playing in the background at the grocery store, the joyful noise from the children playing on the playground, or the noise of a car zooming by as we take our daily walk, sound is almost always with us.

This absence of noise, this silence can be unsettling. In Erling Kagge's book Silence in the Age of Noise, he writes "Silence is fine to have on hand when you are feeling sad. Beyond that, it's useless."

Lent is often filled with silence. It's not useless silence, but rather it is a deliberate silence that gives us an opportunity to collect our thoughts, to pray, and to remember the work that God is doing in our lives. As we move from Lent to Easter, let us remember that silence is a tool that God can use to help us refocus on what really matters in life – reconnecting with God.

On Maundy Thursday the altar (and church) is stripped of candles, kneelers, pulpit and lectern hangings, etc., and the eucharistic elements are removed from the tabernacle from behind the altar reminding us that Jesus will die and be buried. In the dark of Easter morning the new fire is kindled in the garth, the Paschal candle is lit, and then processed into the church. We celebrate Jesus' resurrection as our individual candles are lit and the light of Christ shines in the world once again.

possibility. Sometimes a person is approached by others who see in them a calling they don't necessarily see for themselves. Usually the rector and discernment committees look for the call from within that person, as well as validation of the call within the wider community of faith.

If the process goes forward, a Discernment Committee is formed. It is the responsibility of that committee and the applicant to prayerfully and deeply listen for the Spirit's guidance to discern which order of ministry may be opening up. All three orders (the laity, presbyterate or diaconate) should be considered for the applicant, not just that of ordained ministry. Sometimes the call is very clear for the person and the committee; sometimes it takes time to unfold; and occasionally it changes even after the



committee and applicant have diligently explored and announced the result of their work together.

After discernment, seminary and ordination, the newly ordained participates in the liturgy according to his or her role. A key difference between priests and deacons evident in the worship setting is that a priest ordinarily presides over a worship service, and a priest always consecrates the bread and wine and offers a priestly blessing over the congregation. One of the vows a priest makes that is different from a deacon is to "endeavor to minister the Word of God and the sacraments of the New Covenant, that the reconciling love of Christ may be known and received." (BCP 532). The deacon prepares the table (the altar) on behalf of the congregation and joins the priest at the table as an icon to all that together we are the body of Christ called to serve and share in the healing of the world. Additionally, the deacon proclaims the Gospel, the good news of God's love for all people, invites the congregation to self-examination and confession of shortcomings that keep us from the full expression of that love, and dismisses the people to take God's love and forgiveness back into the world, which is in line with the role of a deacon to bring the church to the world, and the world to the church.


