The Way of Love REV. ROBIN

We pray for our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry every Sunday. For the last three years he has inspired and encouraged us, calling us "The Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement." And this year, he became one of the most famous preachers in the world after his message on love at the Royal Wedding went viral on the internet.

Bishop Michael preached another fabulous sermon on July 5, at the opening of the General Convention, a churchwide gathering that happens every three years. (A link to that sermon can be found in your weekly email, or on the Episcopal News Service website). In the sermon, Bishop Michael launched what he calls

"The Way of Love: Practices for a Jesus-Centered life."

After three years of talking about love, welcome, following Jesus, and being transformed, Bishop Michael realized that people were wanting more. He and his team looked back to the an-

cient monastic tradition for wisdom on how to follow Jesus in this fast-paced world we live in today.

"The Way of Love" is a simplified rule of life, or way of committing ourselves to prayer and action. There are seven words in the Way to help guide us:

- Turn: Pause, listen and choose to follow Jesus.
- Learn: Reflect daily on scripture, especially the life and teachings of Jesus.
- Pray: Spend time with God in prayer every day.
- Worship: Gather in community for worship every week.
- Bless: Share one's faith and find ways to serve other people.
- Go: Move beyond one's comfort to witness to





Dodgers Lose 17-4 to Baptist - On June 23rd, the Dodgers (0-4) remain winless after only getting 10 hits on offense. Aaron Rose (2/3) .667; Jamie O'Grady (2/3) .600 with a Triple and RBI; and Glenn Honda (2/3) .667) all had 2 hits each. Mike McGough (1/3) .333 with 2 RBIs; Susan Hink (1/3); Andrew Welch (1/2) with a Double and RBI; and Doug Hall (1/3) .500 finished out the meager (10/26) .385 day with a hit. Bruce Difley (0/0).667) had 3 straight walks in the game. Mike (0-1) pitched his first game of the year. Thanks to Glenn for helping out the team in a time of need.

Angels Comeback Falls Short in 13-10 Loss - The Angels (1-2) rally in the 6th and 7th innings fell 3 runs short of a victory against NOVA 2. The (16/36) .444 offense was led by a perfect day from Bruce Difley (3/3) .750 with a RBI and Run; coupled with 2-Hit multiple hit games by Doug Hall (2/4) .500 with a RBI and Run; Glenn Honda (2/4) .500 with 3 RBIs; Susan Hink (2/4) with a RBI; Jim Sullivan (2/4) .333 with a Double and 2 Runs; and Caren Brownlie (2/3) .500 with a Double and 2 RBIs aide the offense. This game should have been won but 10 unearned runs on errors felled the Angels. Mike McGough (0-1) took his 2nd loss on 2 different teams today.

Dodgers Come Back Too Late in 10-6 Loss - On June 30th the Dodgers (0-5) did not score a run until the 6th and 7th innings and fell short to 1st place NOVA 1. The sluggish offense (15/35) .429 was led by Three-it games by Autumn Hoffman (3/4) .563 with 2 Runs and newcomer Ken Bradley (3/4) .750 with 2 RBIs. Mike Whitehill (2/4) .444 with 2 Runs; Jamie O'Grady (2/4) .571; and Doug Hall (2/2) all had 2-Hits each. Finishing out the offense with 1-Hit each were: Sean McCue (1/4) .400 with a Double; Glenn Honda (1/3); and Andy Simon

(1/4) with a RBI. Thanks goes to Ken from San Francisco, Betty Galindo and Doe Inouye who shored up our defense and helped us out as subs. Sean (0-3) took his 3rd loss.

Angels Lose to First Presbyterian 12-4 - The Angels (1-3) managed only 9 hits in a lost to the Presbyterians. Only Caren Brownlie (2/3) .545 with a Run; Bruce Difley (2/2) .800 with a Double, RBI, Run; and Glenn Honda (2/3) with a RBI were able to have multiple hit games. Andy Simon (1/3) with a Run, RBI; Autumn Hoffman (1/2) .286 with a RBI; and Andrew Welch (1/2) .455 managed the other 3 hits. Autumn (0-1) hurling for the first time took the loss from the mound.

Angels Brownlie, Difley, Sullivan Tally 9 Hits in Loss - The Angels (1-4) took a 2nd loss of the day by losing to Kings Way 17-12. Offense was better in this game as the team hit (19/36) .528. 3-Hit games by Caren Brownlie (.600) with 2 RBIs, 2 Runs; Bruce Difley (.786) with 3 Runs, 2 RBIs; and Jim Sullivan (.455) led the offense. Other multi-hit games by Doug Hall (.438) with 2 Runs; Andy Simon (.455) with 2 RBIs; Autumn Hoffman (.364); and newcomer Elyse Ordorica (.500) with a Double, 2 RBIs. Andrew Welch (.429) with 2 RBIs; and Art Castillo (.071) garnered 1 Hit each. Autumn (0-2) is still winless.

Dodgers Lose 7th Straight 22-13 to NOVA 1 - On 7/14, The last place Dodgers (0-7) had an early lead at 8-6, but 1st Place NO-VA 1 scored 16 runs in the last 3 innings. 3-Hit games by Dana Ramsey (3/4) .625 with 5 RBIs, Mike Whitehill (3/4) .538; and Mike McGough (3/4) .571 with a Double, 3 Runs fueled the offense. Aaron Rose (2/3) .667 with 3 Runs; Jamie O'Grady (2/4) .556 with a Triple, 2 Runs; Brianne Bosnak (2/4) .429 with a Double, 3 RBIs; and Andy Simon (2/4) .421 finished out the multi-hit batting. Mike McGough (0-2) took the loss.

St. Cross Senior Sermon

A great tradition at St. Cross is our students graduating high school have the opportunity to share with us about how St. Cross has been an influence in their lives. Thank you Sierra for taking the time to share with us!

I think that today, at least with the younger generation, religion of all types is often regarded as something of the past, something unprogressive and unwelcoming to anything new or different. However, I've never felt that St. Cross parallels this image. I've never felt that I go to a church where inclusiveness is preached, but people are shut out because of their race or sexuality or another minute characteristic that somehow becomes a defining factor in the eyes of others. I'm proud to be able to tell my friends that at St. Cross, everyone is welcome; that it is truly an environment of unconditional support and love. Growing up here, I've felt the



constant warmth that radiates from the congregation. There is always someone asking how I'm doing, checking in on me, and all in all taking care of each other. These are some of my favorite memories from St. Cross:

- Singing hymn 412, "Earth and all stars", almost every week in Sunday school when we were around 10 years old. It
 was our absolute favorite song and we would always ask to sing it while learning to read the hymnals. I remember
 being so proud at my elementary school when I was asked if I knew how to read music with verses, and I could say
 yes because of the amount of times I'd sung hymn 412 during Sunday school.
- Vacation bible school, from being one of the youngest campers to being a group leader. It was all so much fun, from singing the songs all week to helping my mom plan arts and crafts to the huge water balloon fight at the end of the week.
- My first time acolyting and really feeling like a part of the service, even though I was nervous and didn't know where to stand in the procession.
- My first time acolyting as lead cross, again nervous, but this time confident in my place in the procession, as I was sure there should be no one in front of me.
- Parking lot duty, spending the day in the sun directing cars, while managing to mess around on the walkie talkies at least a little bit and snagging some pizza before the end of our shift. At the end of the day, I left feeling fulfilled because I knew our efforts were going to an exciting, long-awaited cause - pilgrimage.
- Traveling to Spain on my pilgrimage with my Sunday school class to experience a new place and culture. We tried
 different foods (with marzipan and churros con chocolate becoming new favorites), experienced beautiful
 architecture built hundreds of years ago to honor God, melted in the Spanish heat, and I slipped while trying to run
 through a fountain.
- In preparation for our confirmation, we explored our faith by learning about the faiths of others through video lessons. It was interesting to recognize the common threads that run through the world's major religions, especially because they are often depicted as being so different.

All of these experiences would not have been possible without St. Cross, a place where I can feel God's presence, as well as the love of others. For this, I'm grateful, so thank you.

Bible Study 101




