A Sunday or two ago we heard two parables about seeds Mark 4:26 -34. The first parable spoke about how a person plants a seed and then the earth does its job and grows the seed into a plant worthy of harvest. The second parable is about once a seed is planted it can grow by leaps and bounds, outside of our control (this is a good thing, though sometimes it may be scary at first). replace the one that caught fire two years ago. And we will be re-voicing our organ to better fit our space. We will be restoring our stained glass windows and putting in a new protective covering so that they will last for years to come. We are repairing dangerous cracks in our church walls and sealing off water leaks that have plagued us for years. In the education building we are reformatting the classrooms to be multi-functional so that outside groups can use the rooms. We hope to put in an

elevator/lift so that everyone has equal access to the second floor. We plan to begin some kitchen renovations, that will likely be ongoing beyond the campaign fund itself.

A current Vestry goal is to let the wider community know that we are here and we are ready to welcome groups that need a place to meet. While we are happily in a long term relationship with Temple Shalom, we also have lent space to the Boy

Scouts, a French class, a Chinese singing class, the HB Historical Society, Sandpipers, CASA, and many more. This type of inviting environment is just one way in which we can serve our local community.

Our goal is \$1.5 million to accomplish these important tasks for St. Cross and those we serve. We already have \$1,177,200 collected from only 65


them, we bless the backpacks and bags of students from preschool to graduate school.

St. Cross Softball: Batter Up!

Hey softball fans, we started our 25th year as part of the South Bay Church Athletic League Co-ed Softball League on June 9th. The Angels will try to improve on last year's 2nd Place finish in the "D" Division and the Dodgers will be defending their 1st Place Championship this year. Now let's get to the opening 2018 weekend results.

Angels Defense Smothers First Presbyterian 14-4

On June 9th, the Angels (1-0) started the season off on the right foot while getting 19 hits in a route of First Presbyterian. Perfect days at the plate by Susan Hink (4/4) 1.000 with 2 RBIs; Bruce Difley (3/3) 1.000 with a Double, 4 RBIs, 2 Runs; and Sean McCue (2/2) 1.000 with a Triple and 2 Runs paved the way. Three-Hit game by Shane Mathews (3/4) .750 with 3 Runs, 2RBIs coupled with Two Hit games by Andy Simon (2/3) .667 with 3 Runs; Caren Brownlie (2/3) .667 with 2 RBIs; and Andrew Welch (2/4) .500 with 2 RBIs aided the offense. Sean (1-0) recorded his 8th straight win over two years from the mound.

Dodgers Bats Cold in 17-10 Loss to Lawndale Wesleyan

The Dodgers (0-1) only accumulated 13 hits for .542 team batting average against a good young Lawndale Wesleyan team. Offense leaders were

Bruce Difley (2/2) 1.000 with 2 Runs; Autumn Hoffman (2/2) 1.000; Sean McCue (2/3) .667 with a Double, 4 RBIs; Shane Mathews (2/3) .667 with 2 RBIs; and Doug Hall (2/3) .667 was all the offense mustered. Sean (0-1) finally lost a game from the hill. Mike Whitehill (0/1) .000 filled in at Shortstop and he was a welcome sight for the defense, need him to play more.

Angel Bats Non-Existent in 18-3 Loss to NOVA 2 On June 16th the Angels (1-1) complied only 4 hits in this very sluggish game. The meager offense was led by Doug Hall (2/2) .500 with 2 Hits, 1 RBI, 1 Run; coupled with 1-Hit games by Andrew Welch (1/2) .600; and Eileen Mathews (1/2) .500 with 2 RBIs. Andy Simon (0/1) .500 did score 2 Runs. Eileen (0-1) lost her first game from the mound. Newcomer and Dave and Bitsy Lutton's grandson, Andrew Foster played this game while visiting and did well.

Dodgers Lose 15-6 Against a Powerful NOVA 1 Team

The Dodgers (0-2) only accumulated 12 hits in 33 at bats for a low .394 team batting average. Multiple hit games by Doug Hall (3/3) .833; Bill Hamilton (2/3) .667; Jeff Ramsey (2/4) .500 with 2 Doubles, 2 Runs; and Dana Ramsey (2/4) .500 with 3 RBIs led the offense. Sean McCue (1/3); Autumn Hoffman (1/4) .500; Andy Simon (1/3) .333 with a Double; Brianne Bosnak (1/3) with a Double all had 1-Hit each. Sean (0-2) lost his second game in a row while pitching.

O'Grady's Home Run, 4 Hits, 6 RBIs Not Enough as Dodgers Lose 25-14

The Dodgers (0-3) had 20 Hits but it was not enough to overcome Lawndale Wesleyan young team. Jamie O'Grady (4/4) .571 had a banner game with a Home Run, Double, 6 RBIs, 3 Runs.

Other multiple hit games by Autumn Hoffman (3/3) .667, with 2 Runs; Andy Simon (3/5) .455; Mike Whitehill (2/4) .400 with a Double, 3 Runs; Bill Hamilton (2/3) .667 with a Triple, Double, 3 RBIs; Bruce Difley (2/3) with a Double, 2 Runs; and Andrew Welch (2/4) .429 all aided the offense. One-Hit games were had by Miranda

Marquez (1/3) and Peggy Hamilton (1/4) .143. Bill (0-1) made his debut on the mound and took the loss. Thanks to newcomers Mike Whitehill and Miranda Marquez for helping out the team.


