Habits that Make Up the Patterns of Our Lives





Notes

1736 - As many of you know, St. Cross started the 1736 House for runaway youth in the early 70's. After a few years, the organization was spun off into its own independent non-profit. A board was formed and leaders were hired. We have continued our relationship as the 1736 House has continued to use the original house at 1736 Monterey Blvd. However, after many decades the 1736 House (organization) is moving out. We are thankful for the many years of our shared relationship. We look forward to finding ways to continue to connect with them in the future. Toby Quintiliani from the 1736 House will be here to speak to us on Sunday, Sept. 9 at 9 am between the services.

You may ask what is going to happen to the property. The Vestry has asked that a property committee be formed to investigate the potential for use as an outreach center or alternatively use as a rental unit to support St. Cross's mission and outreach programs. McCue, Hoffman, Brownlie & Difley Lead Angels to 14-10 Win - On July 21st the Angels (3-5) pounded out 20 Hits while beating 1st Presbyterian by 4 Runs. The offense was led by Sean McCue (4/4) 1.000 with 2 Triples, 3 RBIs, 4 Runs; Bruce Difley (3/3) .783 with 3 RBIs; Caren Brownlie (3/3) .667; and Autumn Hoffman (3/3) .588 with 3 Runs; 2 RBIs. Other multiple hit games were by Shane Mathews (2/4) .769 with 2 RBIs, 2 Runs; and Doug Hall (2/3) .500 with 3 Runs. Totaling 1-Hit each were Andy Simon (1/2) .500 with 3 RBIs; Glen Honda (1/3) .500; and Jim Sullivan (1/1) .389. Sean (2-0) remained undefeated for the Angels while hurling for the team.

Dodgers Get Whacked 24-7 for Eighth Loss - On July 28th the Dodgers (0-8) only managed 7 Runs all in the last inning while losing to Lawndale Wesleyan 24-7. The meager 10-Hit offense was led by Bruce Difley (3/3) .778 with a RBI, Run; and Doug Hall (2/3) .588 with a RBI were the only ones to manage a multiple hit game. The offense finished with 1-Hit games by Jamie O'Grady (1/3) with a Double, RBI, Run; Elyse Ordorica (.333) with a RBI, Run; Rich Wenzel (1/1) 1.000 with 2 Walks; Andrew Welch (1/2) .500 with a Run; and Susan Hink (1/3) .333 with a Run. Sean (0-5) hurled from the mound.

Angels Hamilton and Ordorica Have Perfect Day at the Plate in 10-7 Win - The Angels (4-5) played their last game of the year and finished the season with 3 Wins in a row. They beat

1st Place King's Way by 3 Runs. Perfect days at the plate by Bill Hamilton (3/3) 1.000 with 2 Doubles, 3 RBIs; and Elyse Ordorica (3/3) .714 with 2 Doubles, 3 RBIs, 3 Runs coupled with multiple hit games by Andrew Welch (2/3) .429 with 3 Runs; Bruce Difley (2/3) .769; Mike Whitehill (2/3) .667 with 2 Doubles, 3 RBIs, 2 Runs; Macy Jaeger (2/3) .286; and Mike Welch (.750) all had 2 hits each. Finishing the 18-Hit offense with 1-Hit each were Doug Hall (1/3) .483; and Jim Sullivan (1/3) .381. Eileen Mathews (1-1) notched her first win of the year on the hump.

Dodgers Win! Dodgers Earn First Win, 22-11 - On August 4th the Dodgers (1-8) finally arrived in the win column with a 22-11 victory over Baptist. The (31/44) .705 offense carried the team to victory. Other multiple hit games by Jeff Ramsey (3/5) .556 with 2 Triples, Double, 3 RBIs, 3 Runs; Sean McCue (3/4) .483 with 3 RBIs, 2 Runs; Mike Whitehill (3/4) .588 with 2 Runs; Bill Hamilton (3/3) .778 with a RBI; and Peggy Hamilton (3/4) .400 with 2 Runs had terrific day at the plate. The 31-Hit offense was complete with Britney Bosnak (2/4) .429 with a Double, 2 RBIs, 3 Runs; Caren Brownlie (1/4) .111 with 2 RBIs; and Doug Hall (1/3) .550. Sean (1-5) notched his first win of the year for the Dodgers.

Thank you so much for giving me such an amazing opportunity to go to Camp Stevens. I had a fantastic time.



1736 Family Crisis Center

A grateful 1736 Family Crisis Center reflects on 46 years of magnificent memories and a strong partnership with St. Cross Episcopal Church and its members and looks forward to many years ahead of shared vision to help those in need. What started in 1972 by St. Cross as 1736 House (a Hermosa Beach shelter to give kids safety from the streets, food, clothing, and counseling) has since grown to a larger agency helping thousands of children and adults. St. Cross and its parishioners have generously provided decades of inspiration, love, support, the physical youth shelter, donations of all kinds, volunteers, and encouragement, all to ensure that children and their families would receive the life-saving and respectful care they need. Today, 1736 Family Crisis Center has multiple locations and an expanded professional team. Our reach is to those who face homelessness, domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, child abuse, bullying, thoughts of suicide, drug use and addiction, broken families, depression, veteran trauma, and personal crisis. We continue to give loving residential care with 24-hour intake, as well as mental health, legal, police partnership, job development, schooling enrichment, 24-hour suicide/crisis hotlines, outreach and educational programs, housing placement assistance, and long-term follow-up support. Through direct service provision, prevention, and outreach, annually we help about 26,000 people.

A dream and goal of 1736 Family Crisis Center has been to establish a permanent youth shelter with a backyard for the kids, ADA accessibility, counseling and homework rooms, and a creative center where kids would be empowered by musical expression, movement, and the arts. It finally became a reality this year, thanks to St. Cross's ongoing support, and to private and public donations including a major gift from the Everychild Foundation. In 2018, 1736 Family Crisis Center relocated the youth shelter, opening its newest location, with an adjoining empowerment center for the children, purchased and renovated with grant funds to fulfill dreams (some of the children substantially assisted in the design). It never would have been possible without the vision and partnership with St. Cross. We couldn't be more grateful.

1736 Family Crisis Center would like to recognize and extend our warmest thanks to St. Cross, the Vestry, Clergy, staff and each and every parishioner for their years of commitment and dedication to working with us to save vulnerable lives. 
